By participating, you will be helping the District manage and protect the natural resources of Lake County. For the last 23 years the plant sale has been used as the main fundraiser for the District, a non-profit organization. Prairie plants are very well adapted to the climate conditions of our area. They can withstand the changes in weather with very little human intervention. The dry weather of Illinois in the past years has made prairie plants ideal choices in gardening. They require maintenance (watering and weeding) during

their initial establishment which takes up to 3 years, but after that period they will adapt very well to a range of conditions. They will help you conserve water and save money since they do not require watering during dry conditions. Their root systems go deep in the soil (some up to 10 feet) and use available water more effectively than non-native plants. Please consider prairie plants as a great choice in your conservation efforts. They come in a variety of colors and attract butterflies, hummingbirds and other beneficial insects.

EVERGREENS - 10 PER PACKAGE

NORTHERN WHITE CEDAR (*Thuja occidentalis L.*) Resinous and aromatic evergreen tree with an angled, buttressed, often branched trunk and a narrow, conical crown of short, spreading branches. Leaves are dull yellow green above, paler blue-green beneath. Bark is light red-brown, thin, fibrous, and shreddy. Height reaches 40 to 70 feet and the diameter is 1-3 feet.

<u>WHITE PINE (*Pinus strobus*)</u> Produces long, soft needles in bundles of five and is fast growing and long lived. Grows best in moist, well-drained soils, but can survive under various conditions. Thrives in sun, but can tolerate some shade.

<u>COLORADO BLUE SPRUCE (*Picea pungens f. glauca*)</u> A spruce known for its distinctive blue-green coloring. It prefers moist, rich soil and full sun. May reach 30-50 feet in 50 years of growth. One of the most popular landscape evergreens.

DECIDUOUS TREES

SWAMP WHITE OAK (*Quercus bicolor*) It is a frequent inhabitant of wet woods, swamps, wetlands, bottomlands, and near bodies of water, although it is very drought tolerant and can be planted in soils that are dry in summer. Swamp White Oak may reach 70 feet tall by 60 feet wide at maturity, when found in the open.

SCHUETTE OAK KIMBERLEY SELECT (*Quercus x schuettei "Kimberley"*) A cross between a Bur and White, this is a prolific every year bearer of acorns and one of the best oaks for wildlife. This is a native species and it grows to a height of 50 feet.

NORTHERN RED OAK (*Quercus rubra*) An excellent shade tree with great fall colors. Relatively fast growing, often averaging two feet per year. Grows best in moist, well-drained, sandy loam soils that are slightly acidic. Tolerates air pollution, making it a good urban tree. It has lobed, pointed leaves that turn bright red in the fall. It can grow up to 115 feet.

PIN OAK (*Quercus palustris*) One of the fastest growing oaks, this pyramidal-shaped tree is widely planted as a lawn and street tree. It tolerates wet conditions, but thrives in rich, acidic, well-drained soil. Its foliage is light green to bright, green becoming rusty-orange to red in the fall. Grows to a height of 60-70' and tolerates urban conditions.

<u>WITCHHAZEL</u> (*Hammamelis virginiana*) Witchhazel is one of a very few species that flowers in autumn. It has yellow flowers, with petals very narrow and randomly curved. Prefers woody areas and wet soils. Reaches 10-25 feet. Fruits appear in August - October, with seed pods always visible. Flowers September - November.

<u>AUTUMN FLAME MAPLE (Acer rubrum "Autumn Flame")</u> This is an excellent rubrum cultivar with bright red fall color and a compact, rounded habit. Mature height and spread is 30 to 35 feet. It grows best in full sun and it widely adaptable to a variety of soils.

SYCAMORE (*Platanus occidentalis*) A very large growing native tree that will thrive in almost any planting location. It has a wide spreading open crown. Mature specimens may reach 80 feet or more with similar spread. It grows best in sun to partial shade; prefers moist, well drained soils.

<u>PAW PAW (Asimina triloba)</u> It is a small native tree that grows to 20 feet or less, with dark, tropical-looking leaves and edible banana-like fruit. It produces unmistakable purplish-brown flowers in April. The oddly-shaped fruits are edible, if you're lucky enough to find a ripe one before it's harvested by wildlife.Pawpaws do best in deep, fertile soil that is moist, but well-drained and slightly acidic. Avoid heavy, wet, alkaline soil.

HACKBERRY (*Celtis occidentalis*) This rapidly growing hardwood has ridged, pebbled bark, and produces fruit that is relished by birds and wildlife. Reaches a size of 50-75 feet, forming a compact, oval crown. Thrives in the adverse conditions of the Midwest, tolerating wetness, dryness, salt, compaction, pollution, and acid to alkaline soils.

NORTHERN REDBUD (*Cercis canadensis*) Small to medium sized tree, occasionally reaching 40' in height. Branches 10'-15' above the ground into a spreading, flattened or rounded crown. The leaves are simple and heart shaped, appearing after the magenta flowers bloom in early spring. Found in fertile, moist sites along streams and in moist woodlands. Prefers deep to filtered shade.

<u>TULIP TREE (Liriodendron tulipifera)</u> The tree sometimes reaches a height of 200 feet and frequently shows 50-100 feet of trunk without a branch. The bark is smooth and brownish gray. The leaves are very smooth with a broad notch at the tip. The flowers are tulip-like, green-orange in color, and are 1-3 inches deep.

BUTTERNUT (*Juglans cinerea*) Butternut also called white walnut or oilnut, grows rapidly on well-drained soils of hillsides and streambanks in mixed hardwood forests. The sweet nuts are prized as a food by man and animals. Butternut is easily grown but must be transplanted early because of the quickly developing root system Item # 212

SHOWY MOUNTAINASH (*Sorbus decora*) A smooth-barked, deciduous shrub or small tree, growing up to 30 feet high, has a short trunk, slender, spreading branches, and a narrow, open round-topped crown; has numerous flowers in showy round or flat-topped clusters, appearing in June and July. Produces scarlet berries in loose clusters, ripening in August and September. Prefers full sun to part shade.

FRUIT TREE

AMERICAN PLUM (*Prunus americana*) Is a small, deciduous, single trunk tree or multi-stemmed shrub which occurs in rocky or sandy soils in woodlands, pastures, abandoned farms, streams and hedgerows. As a tree, it typically grows to 15-25' tall with a broad, spreading crown. Flowers are followed by edible, round, red plums with bright yellow pulp which ripen in early summer.

SHRUBS & OTHER SPECIALTIES - 3 PER PACKAGE

BAILEY RED-TWIGGED DOGWOOD (*Cornus sericea f. baileyi*) Valued for its brilliant red stem, produces clusters of white flowers in the spring which are followed by a crop of white fruit. An extremely adaptable plant that will tolerate moist conditions. Excellent for mass plantings. Effective for soil stabilization on slopes and banks.

GRAY DOGWOOD (*Cornus racemosa*) A thicket-forming, deciduous shrub, growing to 16 ft. in height with greenish-white blossoms in open, terminal clusters. Prefers wet to dry soils in open areas with full sun or light shade.

SHADBLOW SERVICEBERRY(*Amelanchier canadensis*) A native, multi-stemmed shrub growing to a height of 15-20 feet. In spring, the plant is covered with white flowers, followed by reddish to purple berries that are a favorite of both humans and birds. Tolerates partial shade.

<u>AMERICAN HAZELNUT (Corylus americana)</u> Also known as the American Filbert, Hazelnut is one of the most common shrubs of our native woodlands. rows to 8-10 feet. An excellent addition to a native landscape setting. Tolerates shade.

ARROWWOOD VIBURNUM (*Viburnum dentatum*) This native is a multi-stemmed shrub with an upright, rounded habit. The foliage is thick, dark green and glossy throughout the growing season. Creamy-white flowers appear mid to late June, followed by clusters of metallic-blue fruit from late August through October. Yellow to reddish fall color very late in the season. Grows up to 10 feet in full sun to partial shade.

BLACKHAW VIBURNUM (*Viburnum prunifolium*) This native is a large shrub with white flowers that show in May and are followed aby a pinkish fruit that slowly changes to black by October. It has an excellent reddish-purple fall color. It grows best in full sun to part shade, in dry to medium moisture. It is soil adaptable.

SPICE BUSH (*Lindera benzoin*) It is a rounded, deciduous shrub, that grows up to 10 feet. It has profuse greenish-yellow flowers in mid April with scarlet berries in the fall and gold/yellow fall foliage. It grown best full sun to partial shade and prefers moist, well-drained soil. This plant is attractive to bees, butterflies and/or birds.

ALPINE CURRANT (*Ribes alpinum*) A dwarf, compact, dense shrub, grows to a height of 3-4 feet. Excellent for low hedges or landscape plantings around the home. Leafs out in early spring. Does well in shade. Produces an abundance of red fruit.

<u>DWARF BURNING BUSH (Euonymus E. Alatus Compactus)</u> This shrub is distinguished by vibrant scarlet foliage and small red-orange fruit in the fall, as well as unusual, corky "wings" which flare out along its branches. Grows only to 6-10 feet. Prefers full sun to part shade.

<u>TURES BURNING BUSH (Euonymus E. Alatus Tures')</u> A nice uniform selection of Euonymus Alatus which resembles Compacta, except that it has larger, brilliant scarlet, almost fluorescent fall color. Excellent for hedges, screens, mass plantings or as a specimen. A symmetrical form achieved with little to no pruning; maximum height is 5-6'.

MISS KIM LILAC (*Syringa patula 'Miss Kim'*) Very hardy, dwarf lilac. Glossy, green foliage turns burgundy in autumn. Produces large lavender flowers that fade to a pale pink. Grows 3-5 feet.

ROYALTY LILAC (*Syringa x josiflexa 'Royalty'*) This larger cultivar has deep green, leathery foliage with purplish undertones. Very large, showy, burgundy blossoms emerge 3 weeks after common lilacs. Grows to 10 feet.

GOLDFLAME SPIREA (*Spiraea x japonica 'Goldflame'*) A dwarf shrub (2-3 ft.), producing golden foliage that turns lime-green in summer and produces light crimson flowers in mid-summer. A very colorful addition to your landscape. Grows best in full sun.

PEPPERMINTSTICK SPIREA (*Spirea japonica 'shibori'*) An unusual, very hardy, Japanese Spirea with deep rose, pink and white flowers on the same plant. Individual flowers often have mixed colors. The foliage is a lustrous green. The shrub forms a handsome mound, which re-blooms throughout the summer. The plant grows to be 2-3 feet, and blooms in June - July. It prefers sunshine to partial shade.

SMOOTH SUMAC (*Rhus glabra*) This very hardy Sumac grows well in dry, poor soil, and will not tolerate wet areas. It produces scarlet-orange foliage in the fall, and attractive, plume-like berry clusters persist into winter. The plant grows to be 6-8 feet, and blooms in June. It prefers sunshine to partial shade.

SNOWHILL HYDRANGEA (*Hydrangea arborescens 'Grandiflora'*) This hardy shrub grows in both sunshine and shade, but likes a heavier soil. It produces large, creamy white flowers that grow up to 8" across. The plant grows to be 3-4 feet, and blooms in July - August.

<u>UPRIGHT RED CHOKECHERRY (A. arbutifolia 'Erecta')</u> Very upright, with exceptional rich fall color. Does well in heavier soils. Shade and/or sun tolerant, grows to 5-7 feet tall, very hardy, blooms in May.

<u>CAREFREE WONDER ROSES (Grandiflora Roses)</u> Starting in spring, this rose is covered with semi-double blooms, combining bold pink on the petal face with a creamy white on the reverse side. Blooms repeatedly through autumn. Glossy green, disease resistant foliage.

<u>CHAMPLAIN ROSE</u> (*Rosa x 'Champlain'*) Champlain has more blossoms than foliage for most of the summer. Its blossoms have a semi-double shape and a velvety dark-red color with a slight fragrance. The blossoms appear in clusters all summer until frost.

DIABLO NINEBARK (*P. opulifolius 'Diabolo'*) Leaves emerge a coppery color, and darken as they age to deep burgundy. Pink flower buds open to a creamy white in late May or early June. An excellent upright spreading plant to about 6-8'. A nice specime that is hardy and relatively pest free. This very hardy plant prefers full sun.

FLAME GINNALA MAPLE (A. ginnala var. 'Flame') A new USDA cultivar selected for its fiery-red autumn leaf color. A very hardy and tough, small growing tree with dense foliage. Fruit turns bright red in summer while the leaves are still green. The scarlet autumn color is as brilliant as any of the Maples. A good plant for specimen screening. Grows to 15-20', very hardy to zone 3, and tolerates full sun and partial shade.

RED PRINCE WEIGELA (*W. florida 'Red Prince'*) This compact, semi-upright, hardy cultivar is noted for its non-fading intense reddish hue of its blossom. Has a strong tendency for a secondary bloom in late summer. A beautiful Weigela cultivar and hardiest of all Weigelas. Grows to be 5-7', blooms in June, and requires full sun.

<u>HERITAGE RASPBERRIES (Rubus 'Heritage')</u> Heritage is an ever bearing raspberry with big crop in June and larger crop from September through fall. High quality with excellent, mild flavor good fresh or for preserving

GROUNDCOVERS, ORNAMENTAL GRASSES & PERENNIALS

LITTLE BLUESTEM (*Schizachyrium scoparium*) A native prairie grass. It can be recognized by its roundish clumps of stems that are somewhat reddish purple in color. The stems turn yellowish orange as the plants mature and go to seed. Prefers full sun and sandy soils.

<u>PURPLE CONE FLOWER (Echinacea purpurea 'ruby star')</u> This native Illinois wildflower has large daisy-like blooms with maroon centers that remain attractive even after the flower fades. A natural butterfly and bird feeder, reaching heights of 2-3'.

EVA CULLUM PHLOX (*Phlox paniculata Eva Cullum'*) A true butterfly magnet with wide clusters of fragrant, clear pink flowers accented by maroon eyes on sturdy, erect stems. Very mildew resistant and nicely compact.

<u>BLACK-EYED SUSAN (Rudbekia fulgida 'Goldstrum')</u> This native Illinois forb, with its golden yellow flowers, brings excellent late season color to an area; great butterfly attracter. Plant in full sun and well-drained soil.

RUSSIAN SAGE (*Perovski atriplicifolia*) This plant blooms for over a month, with gray-green foliage, silverywhite stems and pale-blue to purple flowers from summer through mid fall. Thrives in sun with average garden soil. Excellent winter interest.

EASTERNWOOD FERN (*Dryopteris marginalis*) The leathery, dark green leaves of this sturdy, east coast native are evergreen and form a tidy clump that will not spread. Easternwood Fern is native to rocky ledges and shady edges and prefers moist, rich, well-drained, neutral to acidic soils in full to partial shade. Needs protection from wind. Light to medium shade.



The Soil and Water Conservation District has copies of the new Lake County Soil Survey available in the office. According to William Gradle, State Conservationist, Natural Resources Conservation Service: "Conservationists, teachers, students, and specialists in recreation, wildlife management, waste disposal, and pollution control can use the surveys to help them understand, protect, and enhance the environment. 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
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Staff Changes At SWCD of Lake County
